

WHAT IS *BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT*?

- *Bibliostat Connect* is a powerful web-based software program, with on-line tutorials and help screens throughout, that offers access to public library statistics.
- The State Library worked with New York's Public Library System Directors' Organization (PULISDO) and Baker and Taylor to customize *Bibliostat Connect* for New York's tremendous warehouse of public library data.

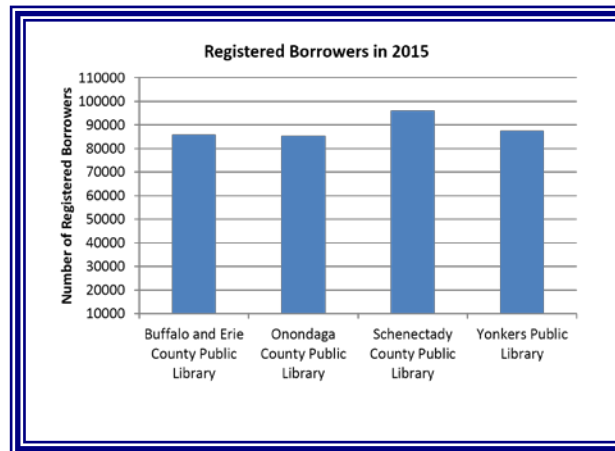

WHAT DOES *BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT* OFFER?

Bibliostat Connect offers library managers and trustees:

- Easy access and manipulation of 25 years of New York's public library data (1991-2015).
- Quick creation of rank order tables and colorful graphs, viewing of averages and percentiles, and organization of the results into a report or presentation.
- Free access to the latest national data from the Public Library Association's Public Library Data Service (PLDS), the Institute for Museum and Library Services' Public Libraries Survey (PLS) (previously known as Public Library Statistics Cooperative for Public Library Data [PLSC]) and the LJ Index of Public Library Service.
- Free access to comparative statistics about libraries across the country through a module that utilizes U.S. Census Bureau data. This includes statistics for income, education, age, ethnicity and more.



THERE'S MORE...

- *Bibliostat Connect* permits users to select and compare public library statistics in three different ways:
 - **Alphabetically** - If you already know the libraries you would like to compare, this option allows you to choose libraries by name.
 - **By Peers** - Selecting libraries by peers is one of the most powerful features of *Connect*. Using this feature, you can quickly create a list of all libraries that meet criteria you define.
 - **By Benchmarks** - Benchmarks are statistical calculations based on groups of libraries that you define. An example of a benchmark would be the state average for the data element.
- *Bibliostat Connect* allows libraries to identify peer libraries and compare public libraries within New York and across the country on hundreds of different measures, including:
 - Circulation, attendance and registered borrowers
 - Library collections and services
 - Income, expenditures, staffing, salaries and benefits
- *Bibliostat Connect* also offers online tutorials and help screens throughout the program to assist the user in navigating the software.

Bibliostat Connect allows you to quickly create rank order tables and colorful charts and graphs.
