I

have not seen him since he fell as this was no chance the was carried off to the pospetal but I have understood from those that serve him that it was not a dangerous avoinet. Stephen was a good Soldier full of his fin we mile him. This has been the hardest Campanga the army of the potomie over had we have in 21 days marchallonaiderable over 2 00 miles fought a 2 days balte dug rifle fails to so forth and without the boys feel bully. We did just clean then out neely their loss from the time They cropped the fotomac until they recreped was 4 2.000 our lop will not exceed 12000 The I'm the afternoon was the bloodrest, part of the battle. at 2 P. M. They opened on us. On the Centre where we were State with over a los Cannon we buy flat on our faces for 2 hours, the air was filled with Shell bursting in every direction.
